Class Formats

Spring Hill's schedule for Spring 2021 includes a mix of in-person, fully online and hybrid courses. Faculty members will create a syllabus for each course that explains the delivery format and tells students what to expect. While each course will be different, they will share certain characteristics.

In-person classes (listed on the schedule as Lecture or Lab) will meet in the assigned classroom at the assigned time. All classroom layouts will be adjusted for social distancing. Faculty and students will wear masks and maintain a social distance of 6 feet.

Hybrid classes will include both in-person and online components. Faculty will contact students prior to the first class to tell them when they should come to the classroom and when they should work online. While the exact format may vary, each student will receive the same instruction and have the same access to the instructor.

Fully online classes will not be assigned a classroom. They may be taught in a synchronous mode (classes meet at the scheduled day and time in an online space) or in an asynchronous mode (class materials will be posted online for students to access on their own time). Most fully online classes at Spring Hill will feature a mix of synchronous and asynchronous activities. The format to be used for each course will be explained fully in the syllabus and the email you will receive from your professor.

Where you can find the format for your class

When you look at your class schedule in BadgerWeb, you will see either a building and room number or "ONLC" for online course. If a classroom has been assigned, the course may be in-person or hybrid. To determine the format of your courses, you can check the schedule posted to the Registrar's BadgerWeb page (<https://badgerweb.shc.edu/ICS/Registrar/>). On the far right, you will see a column for Mode. Lecture and Lab refer to in-person courses, while Hybrid and Online are self-explanatory.

Service-Learning, CLIMB and Other Off-Campus Experiences

Some instructors may substitute virtual service experiences, while others may choose to drop the requirement from the course. Instructors will let you know.

Students needing to meet the CLIMB requirement for graduation in May 2021 will have it waived.

Internships, Field Experiences, and similar off-campus experiences are being carefully reviewed by the faculty in the Division. We recommend that students contact their advisors with any questions.

Students in Education and Nursing must complete such experiences to earn their certifications; faculty in those divisions have been working to ensure that health protocols are being followed and they will keep their students informed.
